"Role" Call! Who is the MPO?

MPO membership is designated by the Governor, and consists of seven voting members from the City of Huntsville, City of Madison, Town of Owens Cross Roads, Town of Triana, Madison County, and the Alabama Dept. of Transportation (ALDOT). The MPO includes these non-voting members: The Top of Alabama Regional Council of Governments (TARCOG), State, and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).

The voting members above are helped in their decision making by two committees. The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) is a volunteer committee. The Technical Coordinating Committee (TCC) is made up of experts appointed by elected officials. The Value of Sidewalks

There are many reasons to talk about sidewalks. Walkable neighborhoods are driving real estate trends and economic development in our region. Public Health goals and Complete Street plans both advocate pedestrian access. In order to keep federal transportation funds, MPO members are required to update their Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Transition Plans (TPs) for accessibility on local roadways. To help all the jurisdictions collaborate, the MPO hosted an Accessology Workshop on ADA TPs in March. Meanwhile, public demand for sidewalks is steadily increasing. Economics, health, and accessibility combined with federal pressure and public demand make sidewalks a new priority for all MPO jurisdictions.

What's the MPO doing next year? Check the UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM: UPWP

MPO staff are hard at work editing and updating our annual budget and work plan for FY 2017. This is a federally required document the staff updates every year. The Bridges of Madison County

District One County Commissioner Roger Jones said: "The much needed Winchester

Road widening and bridge replacement project will make this County road much safer when complete. This is the largest County road project in the history of Madison County." It is an Alabama Transportation Rehabilitation and Improvement Program (ATRIP) project. The County hopes to divert traffic to the newly constructed half of the Winchester Rd. bridge by mid-May. Then the County will remove the existing bridge and complete the remaining portion of the new bridge by early summer of 2017.

nue. HB 394 creates new revenue through a six cent gas tax increase. SB 180 passed, but according to the Alabama County Commission Association (ACCA): "It is clear at this point that there is not enough time for the gas tax [HB 394] to complete the legislative process before final adjournment."

Rockets & Research: Resolute Way interchange for more access to Redstone Arsenal

This project will connect Madison Blvd and Governors West to the Redstone Gateway

development, and provide access to Gate 9 from the west, avoiding the SR 255 interchange. Construction is scheduled for FY 2019 and will cost \$37.1 million. The construction should take 3 years, it may be completed in FY 2021. Currently, the project is in the preliminary development stages and a corridor study is 60% complete. The City of Huntsville will soon meet with the Federal Highway Authority about the corridor study.






<u>Coming Soon: ALDOT's Intersection</u> <u>safety upgrades- Roundabouts!</u>

Love them or hate them, more roundabouts are on the way. ALDOT has safety funding earmarked specifically for these circular intersection upgrades.

In our MPO area, the first new roundabout to be constructed with these funds will be in Limestone County at East Limestone Road and Capshaw. The project will begin construction in June 2017 and cost \$757,000. Interstate Updates: FASTLANE- The New Grant in Town

MPO staff supported the City of Huntsville this Spring in the city's endeavor to create a grant application for the Fostering Advancements in Shipping and Transportation for the Long-term Achievement of National Efficiencies (FASTLANE) grant. This new grant opportunity was created by the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, the long-term transportation funding bill passed in December.

FASTLANE is a competitive, national grant program, similar to the popular TIGER grant, but the goals are very different. FASTLANE grants support freight efficiency improvements to our national interstate and freight highway networks. The table at right shows the annual funding for FASTLANE

BIG Picture Principles Survey Results

During the winter and holiday break, BIG Picture conducted a public survey to help us phrase our BIG Picture Principles. 619 people responded, sharing their views for the future of Huntsville. The BIG Picture Principles will provide guidance for developers and elected officials to determine whether a project needs to be built, or plans need to change, to fit the public's vision for our city.

As with everything in the BIG Picture, the public helped write our Principles. A BIG public event is coming up to present the Principles, as well as culminating the first two years of BIG Picture's efforts in Huntsville.

BIG Picture On Display– Major Exhibition

The BIG Picture is preparing a BIG display for the public, to unveil our Principles this Summer. The display will be a series of 40+ boards, set up like a science fair or museum exhibit. By perusing the boards, the public will learn all the aspects of The BIG Picture planning process and have the opportunity to comment and ask questions. The BIG Picture On Display will travel around Huntsville, giving many different residents an opportunity to see the BIG Picture Principles and boards. In the future, we'll use these Principles to help ensure the city is working on projects the public actually wants.

Campus No. 805 to host BIG Picture and Smart Growth America



Complete Streets Workshop June 15!

Campus No. 805, the former Stone Middle School campus, is located at the three-way intersection of Governors Drive, Clinton Ave, and Triana Blvd in Huntsville. It is a mixed-use entertainment venue situated between both of the BIG Picture's visionary Complete Street projects: Holmes Ave and Clinton Ave. Campus No. 805's location will give us the opportunity to visualize future Complete Streets projects up close. When you step out of the workshop, you will face Clinton Ave and can imagine its update.

The goal of the workshop is to explain Complete Streets to the public and outline the benefits of creating a Complete Streets Policy for Huntsville. After the June 15th event, city decision-makers will attend eight hours of training to begin writing Huntsville's first Complete Streets Policy and lay the groundwork for the Holmes and Clinton projects.

- 1. Report news of multi-jurisdictional transportation projects in the cities of Huntsville, Madison and throughout Madison County in a user-friendly, easy to digest and visually pleasing format.
- 2. Educate the public on transportation plans and connect transportation projects of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) with the BIG Picture Huntsville visions and goals for the Huntsville area.
